What's New?

"We too might walk in newness of life." ~Romans 6:4

For most adults, the journey of life has lots of ruts. We fall into them pretty easily, often unaware at first that we have done so. But then things take on a drudgery - work life and home life seem to be just one thing after another, and after a while, it all seems the same thing over and over. We feel trapped by circumstances that are far too familiar; and by default, we just do what everyone expects us to do.

Unfortunately, these circumstances are usually driven by social and economic circumstances. We do the things we do in order to maintain those circumstances. We find ourselves in a rut when the whole meaning of our lives is reduced to maintaining a lifestyle for ourselves and our families.

St. Paul wrote about dying with Christ, being crucified with Christ. I think part of what he meant has to do with letting go of the highest and most prominent motivation in our culture: maintaining the cherished lifestyle of middle-class comfort. If we could somehow allow this motivation to be crucified, we would be set free to walk in newness of life.

The New Testament (the gospels, the Acts, the epistles, the Book of the Revelation) is every bit as strange and crazy as it sounds. The early Christians were radicals committed to a kingdom that really is not of this world. I'm fairly well convinced that nearly all of us are incapable of living the way the New Testament teaches.

And yet... the central part of that message is the miracle of Easter. God transforms us into righteous people. Maybe it happens very slowly; maybe it barely happens at all. But if we hold ourselves open to this transformation, and keep holding ourselves open, perhaps we will walk in newness of life.

Liberation from all that the world expects of us, so that we might be truly free, is the Easter message. This is our hope. This is what we faith. This is walking in newness of life.

In the beginning, things seem to move slowly but in truth, that is a crucial time for laying the foundation of what is to come. Time and effort goes into the original groundwork to ensure a long-lasting and beautiful outcome. Much of that same type growth is occurring right now at Pilgrim Church. We have continued navigating through the post-pandemic world. We are slowly laying the foundation for new programs to be fully up and running. The Crew Committee is examining procedures and making preparations to examine all aspects of supporting and implementing healthy church growth, financial abundance and a spirit of giving. Boards are working towards new ideas and concepts to enrich our congregation. While we are patiently undergoing this construction, remember that the foundation and ground work take time. When it seems like there is no progress, that's exactly when the important internal framework is being completed.



Sometimes it seems that way for us as Christians too. We pray for renewal and rebirth but days and weeks go by before God speaks to our heart. This is a gentle reminder to patiently and lovingly support your own spiritual journey, and a reminder to continue your support of our Church, its structure, framework and congregation. PILGRIM AUXILIARY: PROGRAM FOLLOW-UP



Last month's Pilgrim Auxiliary program had Karli Gordon introducing us to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation as well Miss Quinn and her family. We learned that "Cystic Fibrosis is a progressive, genetic disease that affects the lungs, pancreas, digestive system and other organs," and "causes persistent lung infections and limits the ability to breathe over time." Symptoms include a persistent and often phlegmy cough, wheezing and shortness of breath, saltines of skin (how Salty Q got her name), difficulty processing food enzymes and difficulty gaining weight as well as infertility in males.

Quinn's mom, Alicia shared how each individual's cystic fibrosis is different as it varies upon the mutation combinations present which is effected by the geographic origin of the mutation. For this and other reasons this disease can be very isolating as those with the

disease can not come within 5 - 6 feet apart. Quinn showed us her special vest and how she takes her breathing treatments. Her brother, Seth helped to pass out a special gift to all the participants at presentation. Thank you Karli for helping to inform the world about this debilitating disease and the foundation that is serving by "adding tomorrows." And thank you Alicia for sharing your beautiful family's experience and strength as you support Quinn through this battle. 
LIBRARY NEWS

Behind the Scenes

The Diaconate Board is charged with the responsibility, along with the Senior Minister, for the worship services and the spiritual health of the church. In the time that I have been a member of Pilgrim Congregational Church, some changes which the Diaconate Board have instituted have been easily noticeable, such as small changes in the order of worship for Sunday Mornings, or changes in the communion services. Members and committees from the Diaconate Board also work to organize Greeters, and work with the Ushers and Acolytes.

Other things that Diaconate Board members are involved in take place behind the scenes. For communion services, members come early to prepare the elements, and clean up afterwards. Recently, Lisa Keepers and Sylvia Osborn worked to clean the cross we see on the communion table and the candelabras. We are aware that work needs to be done on the pew candle holders used for special occasions, and we are considering options, including the possible purchase of new or additional oil burning candles, in order to prevent wax drips. Dr. Fay Ellwood ordered new cards for indicating the Hymn Numbers in the holders you see to the right and left of the chancel.



The tool that has been used for years to raise and lower the banners which hang to the right and left of the chancel, and which are changed with the liturgical seasons of the church year was showing signs of age. It had seen several repairs, and some of the banners showed signs of potential damage from the tool. A new tool has been constructed to place and remove the banners without damaging the cloth. 


Surprise Service Field Trip

Nathaniel and Sarah Campbell went to drop off recyclables to Rachel Rop, the wonderful person who started an organization to support students in Kenya that pays for their tuition and fees so they can complete their high school education. However, Rachel wasn't at home, she was at the recycling station processing the donation from Pilgrim Congregational Church that Judy Sanders brought her earlier in the day and she invited us to come on down and join her. Nathaniel and I learned the process and helped separate and count out the recyclables. We didn't just separate cans vs. plastic vs. glass. We also separated between water bottles vs. big plastic items and clear plastic vs. colored or non-clear. Did you know Rachel

gets twice as much money because she does it this way instead of just weighing them in. It was quite rewarding to experience the process. Rachel got over \$16 from what we brought which may not seem like a lot, but that is just from one household. Imagine all the recyclables she has collected from Pilgrim alone over that last couple of years Also, she assured us that was quite a lot for sending down to the students in Kenya. 

HISTORIAN'S CORNER



In 1910, Pilgrim Church, then twenty-three years old, prepared and distributed to members, a 4" by 5 1/2" pocket manual of Church Membership Duties and Responsibilities. This handy and informative little manual was reprinted and distributed as part of Pilgrim's 125th Anniversary Celebration. The Church Manual for members was established approximately one to two years prior to the construction and dedication of our current sanctuary site. A few copies of the reprinted booklet are available for mailing to the first fifteen Pilgrims who email me a request for one at dididinah777@aol.com.

Section I of the Manual covers the Church By-Laws, describing the duties of Church Officers, the Board of Trustees, the Deacons and Deaconesses, the Church Advisory Committee, the Financial Secretary and Treasurer, and the Church Pastor (chosen by vote of the congregation.)

A following section lays out the structure of Church Meetings:


The Annual Meeting was a regular feature, Business Meetings were called to address budget matters, and "Town Meetings" were held for congregation members to review and discuss operational issues. The duty of members to participate in church focus and operations is evident early in our church roots. This structure of consensus and membership oversight continues through to today, well over a century later.

The Manual details the process of Membership Application and includes the Service of Admission of New Members we carry out today as new members are welcomed into Pilgrim Membership. The *Articles of Belief* are also included in this section as an Outline of the Important Teachings of the Scriptures. Nine Articles of Belief are spelled out.

The Manual concludes with "Brief Historical Sketch of Pilgrim Church from 1887 to 1910." At that time, three Pilgrim Ministers had served the Pomona Church: Rev. Charles B Sumner, Rev. L. H Frary, Rev. George Soper, and Rev. Albert P. Davis was appointed at the time of the "new" church construction. He conducted the closing service at the "old" site and the dedication service at the new site.

The final page of the Pocket Manual lists 22 Charter Members of Pilgrim Church in 1887, representing approximately thirteen Pilgrim families and links exist from this list to current Pilgrim membership.

It is not known if any other "Member Manuals" of by-laws, "dos and don'ts and duties" and church history were prepared during the intervening years for use by Pilgrim members. Please check your attics and pockets !!



White symbolizes purity, innocence, and birth. It is associated with the brightness of the heavens during daytime and was used to symbolize the purity of heaven and the angels. It also came to be associated with joy, celebration, and peace. White is the liturgical color of Christmas, Epiphany, and Easter.
