MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER

God's Covenant with All

"... remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature." Genesis 9:16

Lent is a 40-day period prior to Easter that commemorates Jesus' 40 days of temptation in the wilderness. In the Christian liturgical calendar, we observe the beginning of this period on Ash Wednesday and its ending on Holy Saturday, the evening prior to Easter. That's 40 days if you don't count the six Sundays.


Pilgrim Congregational Church will mark these days with several events, beginning with pancake races and a dinner at 6:30 pm on Shrove Tuesday, February 13th, the day before Ash Wednesday. Shrove Tuesday is a day of self-examination, a time to consider what changes that you need to make in your life, and how those changes bear on God's covenant with you. One may decide to make a sacrifice or commitment during Lent that expresses a willingness to make needed changes.

Then, on Ash Wednesday, the next day at 6:30 pm, we will hold a service in the Pilgrim Sanctuary that will include Bible readings, prayer, quiet reflection, and a short version of communion. This will be a time to pray that God will give us strength to keep our commitments, to respond with gratitude for the covenant that God makes with us. As the period of Lent begins, we will prayerfully offer ourselves as co-participants with Christ in our faithfulness to God's covenant through loving the world as Christ does.


One way of expressing our faithfulness to God's covenant is through our attendance at church. There are so many things to do in our lives and we are pulled in many different directions. And yet we know that our relationship with God through the local church is a fundamental way in which we fulfill our commitment to God's covenant.

This year, consider making your Lent sacrifice a commitment to support Pilgrim Church through your attendance, your prayers, and your service. Consider making your presence at Pilgrim a priority, over and above all the distractions that vie for your attention.



PILGRIM TESTIMONIAL PROFILE



Because February is so well known for the celebration of St. Valentine's Day it seemed appropriate to feature member **Aneeka Gray Rivero**, a recent newlywed, married here at Pilgrim. The following is primarily in her own words.

I was brought to Pilgrim by my grandma, Andrea Gray. My first-time attending was when I was younger than 10 years old with my father, Bill Gray, for an Easter service. I remember there being a lot of people in a huge building, but most of all I remember that he insisted that I wear a dress, and I wasn't a dress kind of gal. Fast forward to 2018: I was 25, I had moved back home to live with my grandmother. I was going through a hard time, and I was in graduate school to become a Marriage and Family Therapist. Grandma invited me to go to church with her and I needed the support from her, so I went. The cookies and lemonade were yummy. Grad school was hard. I was grasping for any peace I could find. I tried to make sense of all the information I was getting at the time. I compared what I was learning in graduate school about how to help people with the sermons of Dr. Bingham for how we could help ourselves. I just listened to both and compared. I found a lot of similarities! Just a different type of

language. And Dr. Bingham's jokes and stories were entertaining. Besides the cookies and the jokes though, I didn't believe in God. It was very uncomfortable.

Then I went to Church Camp. (Because Grandma invited me. Why not, right? I had nothing better to do. May as well get some fresh air, and maybe there will be cookies.) We studied the Book of Joy that year (a book that changed my life and one that I reference and share with others frequently.) The Book of Joy made a lot of things in my life make so much more sense and I started to feel more open to what was going on in my life. But then, there was all this Jesus talk and God talk and I got so frustrated I wanted to explode. I confided in Olympia Kunneset that I didn't believe in God, and told her to prove me wrong, and she did. Twenty years of frustration and confusion and feeling isolated from others started to be picked away, lesson by lesson. I met with Olympia a lot during that time, learning piece by piece, and challenging her freely, debating with her, because I knew I could trust her. She hung in there with me through all my argumentation and debate, gave me so much of her time, and I don't think she ever judged me for feeling confused or angry. That was a huge growing point in my testimony, and once I saw it I couldn't unsee it. For the record I also remember having the support of my grandmother in growing my testimony during that vulnerable time, and I am sure there have been others too. (Thank you all for the support you have given and continue to give to me. There truly aren't enough words for me to express my gratitude for all that the people of Pilgrim, and Pilgrim, has done for me.) After Olympia and everyone helped me build my testimony, Pilgrim was my home. It was a safe place for me, unlike any other. The people of Pilgrim are my extended family.

I became a member probably around 2019. I live 2 hours away now, but I watch the services online and I attend in person about 4 times a year. Pilgrim has a very special place in my heart that I don't know can be filled by any other church. I love our Pilgrim culture.

My understanding is that my grandma's mother was also a congregationalist. My Grandma and Grandpa, Andrea and Tom Gray got married and raised their children at Pilgrim Congregational Church in the 70's or so. My grandparents have both served as moderators and other various positions at Pilgrim. My cousin Kodie is active in the youth group and Pilgrim Band.

As for me, I am now a Licensed Marriage and Family Therapist, working in Private Practice. While in school I volunteered for the City of Chino as an MFT trainee, and I worked with elementary aged children in the

school setting, with some adult individuals and couples. After I graduated with my master's in psychology from Cal Poly Pomona, I worked at the Indio Adult Outpatient Clinic with folks who met requirements for higher level of care but not inpatient. I really enjoyed an opportunity to run a group there for adults with stabilized symptoms of psychosis for a year. I learned a ton! Then I returned to working with kids and teens in the foster system, meeting with them individually and trying to provide support to the foster parents as well. In August of 2023 I got my MFT license and ventured into private practice, mostly meeting with individual adults, some couples' work, and some teens.

I like to hang out with my husband, dog, kitties, visit and spend time with family and friends, watch TV shows and movies, read books, spend time in nature such as walking or swimming, go places, try and learn new things, do literary research, and play & watch online video games.

On top of everything else I have mentioned, Dr. Horn and Faye have been huge supports to me as well. I love the loving, inspiring, scholarly, well thought out messages and sermons by Dr. Horn and Faye. It is Dr. Horn and Dr Ellwood, as well as the group of people and leadership that make Pilgrim unique and special to me. Ooh, and I love music too!!! I also had my wedding at Pilgrim in September of last year as well! My husband works as a security guard at a casino. He cooks really yummy food, and he is wonderful to me. His family is wonderful as well.

We are so blessed to have Pilgrim!! Thank you so much to everyone for making Pilgrim what it is today!



Our tall wooden candle holders, placed at the ends of the pews for weddings and Christmas Eve, are approximately 60 years old, and were starting to deteriorate.

Sue Shedd reports they were hand made for Pilgrim by her great uncle, **Lucius William Case.** "Uncle Lu" was the brother of Sue's grandma, Florence Case St. Clair Dunham. Uncle Lu was a missionary doctor, and when he lost his hearing, he returned to the Pomona area as a pathologist for then Pomona Valley Hospital. Uncle Lu loved woodworking and made these holders to fit our pews. Sue recalls helping light the pew candles years ago while growing up.

The Diaconate Board's Andrew Olson and **Lisa Keepers** have located all these historic candle holders (many) and are working to clean, sand and restore them. Over the course of 2023, Andrew has now completed about half of them! You may have seen the restored ones in our sanctuary on Christmas Eve. OUTREACH: HAND IN HAND



We completed another successful Hand in Hand Christmas distribution! There were lots of happy faces as cars were loaded and moms were able to shop in our "Gift Boutique".. Special Thanks to **Nancy Todd** and **Susan Newton** for helping to gather items, setting up, packing up, and helping moms shop in the Gift Boutique. Grateful thanks to **Amy Newell, Janet McBride**, and **Patty Schelling**, for the shopping, transporting, moving, and preparing the distribution room. A HUGE Thank you to everyone who bought food or gift cards or made a donation or adopted a person or kids or a mom or a whole family and made our 36th year happen.

Our Pilgrim Family has supported Hand in Hand for the Holidays by providing food, clothing, and other needs for Christmas. This program started back in 1987 with Don & Judy Sanders and the Diaconate Board. 36 years later, It continues, now sponsored by the Outreach Board, <u>but it couldn't continue without all of you</u>.

This year brought some changes to our process. We took advantage of the sales on food staples and purchased all the food for our 8 families in early November and created our *No Heavy Lifting Grocery Store*. We printed cards with the price of each item and asked that people wanting to contribute towards food for the families choose the items from our "store". This is a reasonably inexpensive opportunity for everyone to participate in the Hand in Hand program. We had apple juice and pasta for \$1 thanks to Von's 10 for \$10 sale and we took advantage of shopping at Sam's Club and Costco bulk packs. We also provided shampoo, soap, toothpaste, and body lotion for each families without going to a store. We were trying to make it convenient to participate. We were fortunate to have so many adopt a family or a person. We also had several gently used items contributed to help with the larger of more expensive items that were on the wish lists. We want to make participation as easy as possible to keep this program going. Please pass any ideas you might have to make participation easier and more fun to participate, please let me know.. YOUTH LENT PROJECT 2024

Each year for Lent the Pilgrim Youth participate in a special service project. This year's Youth Lent Project is going to benefit the:



What is Cystic Fibrosis? The simple answer is that cystic fibrosis (CF) is a progressive, genetic disease that affects the lungs, pancreas, and other organs resulting in many hospitalizing infections and a shortened life span. Another cruel aspect to Cystic Fibrosis is that the genetic mutations causing the condition vary greatly from patient to patient making treatment and finding a cure very complicated. The Pilgrim Youth Lent Project includes 3 vital elements:

65 Roses Campaign: Fundraising Campaign to fund the Cystic Fibrosis Foundations Research, Patient Care and Community Education endeavors.

Hospital Care Boxes:Service Project making care packages for CF patients during hospitalizationsInformative Interactions:Fun and informative events going on each Sunday that promote the Youth Lent
Project while educating our community about Cystic Fibrosis.



65 Roses refers to the story of a mom and her 3 boys who all had cystic fibrosis. Back in 1965, Mary G. Weiss joined the fight at the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation after learning that her 3 boys had CF. Mary's job at CF was to make many calls seeking financial support for CF research. One day her 4 year old son, Ricky told his mom (after listening closely to each call), "I know what you are working for... you are working for 65 Roses." Since the rose is a symbol of love that has come to represent the CF community. The Pilgrim Youth Lent Project includes the **65 Roses Campaign**. Every Sunday a board with 65 roses will be up. Each rose has a monetary amount from \$1-\$65. Participants pick a rose or roses with a number or numbers that are meaningful to them (b-dates, anniversaries, etc.) and donate that amount. For example I may pick 22 for how many years I have been married. There are also blank roses for an amount of your choosing. If each of the 65 roses is purchased the youth will raise \$2,145 for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

The Youth Lent Project includes a physical service project putting together **hospital care packages**. Cystic Fibrosis patients are vulnerable to infections that result in at least 1 to 2 hospital stays a year. These stays can last from 2 or 3 days to 2 or 3 weeks. These Care Boxes will go to hospitals specifically set up to treat patients with CF. They store them and hand them out when a patient is admitted. We will be making 20 unisex boxes for patients 8 to 12 years old. How you can help is by sponsoring in part the contents of the boxes. We are purchasing items in bulk to keep cost low as well as insuring requirements are met and quality is consistent for each box. Much like the Hand in Hand set up, we will have cards with the value of a particular item purchased for the boxes. Also, fliers will be available with directions to make boxes on your own if you are so inspired. These boxes can be gender specific or for a different age group as they have patients from infants to adults. If you turn it in by Sunday March 3rd we can submit them



for you with the youth-made boxes. All boxes will be presented to a special guest on March 3rd.

YOUTH LENT PROJECT 2024

Informative Interactions

Each year during the Youth Lent Project we have activities that relate to the cause of the year. For example, when we did the Heifer Project we had animal ambassadors that represented how Heifer helped impoverished areas of the world. This year we will have an event each Sunday that gets the youth along with all church members and visitors involved with either learning or helping with the project. Below is a calendar of events for each Sunday during Lent.

February 18th:Church Wide Youth Lent Project Kick-Off. There was a preview for those who
attended the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Dinner & Races. On this day, the youth will
lead a presentation explaining the Youth Lent Project and how everyone can participate.
This will also be the official beginning of the 65 Roses Campaign & Hospital Care Box
Sponsorships.

February 25th: Service Project Day. Pilgrim Youth will put together Hospital Care Boxes.

- March 3rd: Quinn's Lemonade Stand & Presentation. Quinn, a little girl living with cystic fibrosis is going to run her Lemonade Stand during Fellowship Hour as well as share with us what life is like with cystic fibrosis. She has visited Pilgrim before with her family for a presentation at Pilgrim Auxiliary. This presentation will also serve as an update on her and the progress the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation has made since she last visited. All Shoebox Floats are DUE today.
- March 10th:Movie Day, for ALL ages. Showing: Five Feet Apart (PG13)
Five Feet Apart is a romantic drama about two young patients with cystic fibrosis who
meet in the hospital and fall in love. They try to have a relationship despite being forced
to stay six feet apart from each other. This will be a great movie to enjoy by the youth &
congregation as well as get a good picture of the challenges that come with cystic fibrosis.
Please note a special 30 minute movie experience for our younger Pilgrims (10 and
younger) will be set up for them as well in a classroom where they will be watching
Hermie and Friends a (G) rated Christian animated movie.
- March 17th:Last Day of the Campaign & It Isn't Easy Being Green Party. Join us as we celebrate
the end of the Youth Lent Project and St. Patrick's Day with a very green Fellowship Hour.

Pilgrim Youth's Lent Project Goals

65 Roses Campaign:

Main Goal: If all 65 roses are purchased Pilgrim will have raised \$2,145 for the Cystic Fibrosis foundation. Bonus: Our youth learn that when many come together to help in little ways, big things can happen.

Hospital Care Packages

Main Goal: To assemble 20 boxes for children with CF who are missing family time, school and playdates while stuck in the hospital being treated for yet another infection thanks to the disease. Bonus: Provide an opportunity to put "their feet to the pavement" to the purpose of helping others through service

Informative Interactions

Main Goal: Opportunities for the congregation to come together to learn the what, whys and hows of the Youth Lent Project through fun, interactive and intergenerational activities. Bonus: Interactive, Intergenerational, educational and fun fellowship.



HISTORIAN'S CORNER



PILGRIM'S CARL H. LORBEER , CAPTAIN OF POMONA'S BOYS BRIGADE

The following article is sourced from the 1920 edition of "The History of Pomona Valley, With Biographical Sketches of Its Leading Men and Women."

Carl Lorbeer was described in "The History of Pomona Valley" as "a splendid and inspiring illustration of making a success of a business while at the same time giving time, thought and faithful attention to a movement for the improvement of society." Lorbeer, a proud California native son, was chief and

assistant manager of the Pomona Valley Telephone and Telegraph Company and served on and chaired numerous Pomona boards, schools, banking and civic organizations well into the 1960's.

Lorbeer was born in Pomona in 1884 and attended Pomona schools. He graduated from Pomona College where he excelled in debate competitions and set records running track. He married at Pilgrim in 1908 and along with wife Rose, taught Sunday School and served on numerous church boards.

Lorbeer's college track and athletic activities doubtless had much to do with forming his active decades long leadership of the Boys Brigade, of which he became the first lieutenant and then Captain of the Pomona Church chapter. The Boys Brigade organized nationally and globally. The Boys Brigade proved to be a large factor in promoting a high standard of young manhood among the boys of Pomona. Our Brigade chapter was organized in the old Pilgrim Church when it was located on the corner of Third and Thomas streets. From a start up of 23 boys in the first Company, it grew rapidly until the membership had to be closed due to lack of room! The new recruits were largely from the ranks of community boys not attending any Sunday School (attendance a program component) and Pilgrim had to scurry to rapidly find additional Sunday School teachers to staff the huge increase.

During the years since its organization, the Company never lost momentum, and hundreds of boys between the ages of 12 and 18 benefited from the structured training gained. Each year it was found necessary to limit membership even though the splendid gymnasium of Pilgrim's new church facilities (1912) afforded much larger quarters and equipment more efficient and useful than at the original site.

Carl Lorbeer is further credited in the sourcebook: "Starting with a small Company of boys, the Pilgrim Boys Brigade grew in a few weeks to many times its original number. Hundreds of new boys were drawn into the Sunday School as active, earnest scholars. As Sunday School attendance was a main component of the Brigade, the result was the average attendance at weekly drill grew to 92% and a large number of boys earned medals for their efforts."

School teachers in Pomona public schools many times expressed notice of the remarkable changes in behavior and character in boys who had been thought unmanageable. High compliments were extended by Pomona's Superintendent of Schools, praising the high value of the military training and responsibility practiced in the Brigade drills. Pilgrim's Brigade continued forward through the decades, winning honors and accolades and eventually establishing a Girls Brigade. Pilgrim maintains a list of the Boys Brigade participants and their last known addresses. A display cabinet adjacent to Pilgrim Hall contains group photos and artifacts from the Program. Inquiries about our chapter still pop up.

Carl Lorbeer's Brigade leadership (and that of other Pilgrims to be named later... I have been made aware of another Brigade book!) Is yet another example of Pilgrim dedication having a profound effect on the Pomona community as well as on the lives of many generations of Pomonians!

Green symbolizes growth and life, hope and anticipation. Green is used in Ordinary time, the period of the Church calendar which gives attention to he Lord's life and ministry; it reminds us that the mission of the Church is to love the world and share the hope of Christ.

White symbolizes purity, innocence, and birth. It is associated with the brightness of the heavens during daytime and was used to symbolize the purity of heaven and the angels. It also came to be associated with joy, celebration, and peace. White is the liturgical color of Christmas, Epiphany & Easter.

Purple was originally associated with royalty because it was a more expensive color to dye, and it was used to welcome the coming of a king. It also evokes pain and suffering. Purple symbolizes fasting, faith, patience, and trust. It is the liturgical color used during the seasons of penance, Advent, and Lent. For Advent, purple symbolizes the impending birth of Jesus while foreshadowing his death.
