MESSAGE FROM THE SENIOR MINISTER

Interpreting the Sacred Text

"So they read from the book, from the law of God, with interpretation." ~ Nehemiah 8:8

The Book of Nehemiah is the extraordinary account of the rebuilding of the walls and the city of Jerusalem following the Babylonian captivity. Nehemiah was given permission to return to Jerusalem to rebuild it. He encountered all manner of opposition, both internal and external resistance to these plans. But he was ultimately successful, restoring the city and repopulating it with the Jewish faithful.

During this rebuilding effort, Nehemiah organized large reading sessions, in which every able man and woman was assembled to listen to the reading of the Law of Moses. It is a striking scene. When Ezra the priest opened the book, the entire throng stood to hear the text. And when they heard it read, they lifted their hands, crying, "Amen, Amen," and fell on their faces to worship God.

The power of a sacred text is difficult to deny. It can bring people to tears. It can shatter the most persistent self-deceptions. It can bring hope to the hopeless. Sacred texts do this in a context of interpretation. That is, a powerful text is an understood text.

It is a remarkable fact of God's grace and mercy that the human practice of writing is used to convey God's love for the world. It is so remarkable that many Christians have difficulty accepting that God's truth might be communicated through documents that are tainted with human errors. They insist that there cannot be errors in the text when there are many.

Both Gospels and the writings of Paul tell us that God has chosen to reveal God's self through the limited and weak human form. This means that divine love is shown in the body and the life of Jesus, and it is shown through the human form of writing.



It is in and through our weaknesses that God is revealed. And so we will keep reading the sacred text, analyzing, studying, and interpreting, looking for signs of the divine even as we acknowledge our human limitations.

MESSAGE FROM THE MODERATOR



The end of one year and the beginning of a New Year is a time for reflection on the past, and thinking of the things we want to accomplish in the New Year. For me as an individual and as the moderator of the church, the past year seems to have passed very quickly. My work as a hospice chaplain keeps me

busy. I start each day with a plan for the families I want to visit and the things I hope to accomplish. On any given day, my phone may ring, and my plan may go out the window, because someone has an urgent need. It doesn't happen every day, but some days when it does happen, I feel that I have been in the right place at the right time.

We have had a number of special activities at the Church. The Christian Education Board, the Membership Board, as well as other boards and committees have been working harder and harder to create opportunities for our own growth and fellowship and to introduce others in our community to new opportunities. The Pilgrim CREW has put together a Jubilee Proposal, which the Church Council is passing to the congregation for approval. The proposal calls for the hiring of an Associate Minister. The Trustees have been working on a proposed budget, and the Church Council has appointed a search committee. If the congregation approves the proposal and the budget, we want to be able to move forward. On January 5, we will have a town hall meeting to discuss and respond to questions about the proposal and the budget.

If you want to know how things get done at Pilgrim Church, I would encourage you to get involved. Visit a Church Council meeting, or a meeting of one of the boards or committees. Say "yes" if you are asked to serve as a member of a board or committee by the nominating committee. Or, volunteer to help with a project or activity or in the church office. Find a place where you can be involved.

It is always a time for prayer, but this seems to be a time of transition for our church, and prayer is especially important for us at this time. Prayer is talking to God, but listening to God is important, too. We listen to God when we read His Word, or better, when we allow His word to "read us." It can also help to be silent and to hear what God may be saying to us through what others say or do.

For about six months I tried to summarize presentations made to the annual meeting of the National Association of Congregational Christian Churches. I am working on editing my earlier pieces into one document without so much repetition. If you are interested, let me know.

May God bless Pilgrim Congregational Church and each of us throughout the New Year!





We are lucky to have each Nancy in our Pilgrim family.





Turns out that his father was born and raised in Santa Cruz and graduated from the same High School she did. Gary's father came to Southern California to attend Pomona College. Gary was born in Hollywood because his mother was an adagio dancer in the movies.

This was 1964 and the draft board was after Gary. You were draft exempt if you were a full time student or married, so Jan and Gary graduated on Friday, had rehearsal on Saturday and got married on Sunday. A couple of years later, they decided that in order to be exempt, you had to have children. Gary was working as a Loan Officer for American Savings in Redwood City. He got a \$50 raise, a new company car and his draft notice all in the same week. Most men were being sent to Vietnam, but Gary,

Jan's brother and brother-in-law all spent a year in Korea instead.

After Korea, Gary ended up going into partnership with a High School friend who had a landscape maintenance business here in the Inland Valley, so Jan and Gary moved to Montclair. Gary went to school and got certified as a Drug and Alcohol Counselor and worked for several years at Chino Community Hospital. Gary was very active in AA. He always said you had to change one addiction with another and he changed his addiction to alcohol with an addiction to running. He had several friends that he ran with. He ran 5 K's, 10 K's, and several marathons. Jan got to see Gary run in the 100th Boston Marathon in 1996!

church. Once he was sure they were all settled into their pews, he'd go up the street and have donuts with some of his buddies. He also drove down to the border to get the Pan American students and take them up to Cedar Lake Camp and back.

Gary was very helpful with the Rummage Sale. He and Tom Shoultz were in charge of the Nuts & Bolts Department. On Rummage Moving Day he helped the Sigma Chi guys get all the rummage to the right rooms. He and Tom decided to open up the garage on Sundays so people could put their donations right in to be sorted.

Gary and Jan Manildi were married for 60 wonderful years. They have 2 fabulous daughters who married terrific husbands and 2 awesome grandchildren. They see themselves as having been truly blessed. Jan shared that she thinks Gary will be

remembered most for his great sense of humor. His last words in the hospital were when their daughter, Joey, was stroking his hand and he looked up at her and said, "Do they pay you to do this? A dollar a day?"

Gary Manildi will be very much missed by his family and Pilgrim friends as well.




